

Through pretend play, kids create their own cup of tea for an imaginary nature tea party!



#### **KEY IDEA**

**Skills** | fine motor skills; gross motor skills; language; emotional; curiosity; creativity

**Duration** | 15-20 minutes

**Setting** | outdoors

Materials | mug or cup, spoon, items found in nature, water (optional)



#### **ACTIVITY**

- 1. Go on a nature hunt! Collect a variety of natural items to create your cup of nature tea.
  - Look for different colours, textures, and smells.
- 2. When you're happy with the number of items that you've found:
  - Choose a place to sit down.
  - Look at everything you collected!
- 3. Select a cup or mug to make your tea in.
- 4. Make your tea!
  - Decide which of your collected items you will use for your tea.
  - Arrange them in the mug or cup you chose.
  - If you want to, add water to your tea!
- 5. Create a name for your special blend of nature tea.
  - Try creating multiple blends with their own unique names!
- 6. Host a tea party! Talk about your cup of tea, and let your family and friends have a sniff!







# **QUESTIONS**

Encourage kids to talk about their choices by asking questions!

- What natural items did you put in your nature tea? Why did you choose those items?
- What did you name your tea?
- What does your tea smell like? What colour is your tea?
- Who would you invite to your nature tea party?



## **SAFETY**

- Some things in nature are not safe for us to eat. Do not eat anything that you find for your tea.
- If using water to make your tea, make sure it is not hot. Warm or cold water is recommended.



## **EXTRAS**

- Add "sugar" or "milk" to your tea using natural items like dirt, sand, or a smaller cup of water. Stir these items into your cup or mug using a stick or spoon.
  - If you are using water, observe whether the items sink, float or dissolve.
- Write or draw the recipe for your nature tea on a recipe card and share it with others!
- Learn the names of the items and plants in your tea using illustrated field guides, the internet, or plant identification apps like <u>Seek by iNaturalist!</u>
